

#### MINISTER'S LETTER

## Do you enjoy church?

As a minister, part of me thinks people should enjoy church; we put enough work into making it engaging and stimulating. I think of the late nights preparing sermons with interesting stories and funny analogies. When I am preparing a service, I think carefully to make sure it engages people on different levels.

But then I stop for a moment and ask myself, do I enjoy church? It may seem like an odd question: I am a priest, of course I do! But if I'm honest, my experiences of churchgoing have had highs and lows with much monotony and routine in between. The truth is, I don't go to enjoy myself; I go because there is something deep inside me compelled to seek God, something which has been bitten by the bug of knowing him. Most of the time I guess my churchgoing is pretty unremarkable, it's not often that I come away deeply moved or elated, or even disturbed or challenged. But it happens enough to keep me coming, keep me seeking.

C S Lewis talks of a sense of being drawn by these glimpses of something beyond. His book *The Pilgrim's Regress* follows the spiritual quest of John, compelled to leave his stifling home in search of something better. He is drawn by a sense of longing he experienced as a child when he glimpsed a far-away island. It made him realise that there is something beyond the narrow confines of the life he had known. This glimpse of the divine is what keeps drawing me back to church.

I have had glimpses of the divine in charismatic services, carried away in worship, speaking in tongues, hands in the air; and I have had these glimpses kneeling before the blessed sacrament in silent



contemplation, as the scent of incense wafts by and spirals up to heaven. But the outward things are not where joy is found. These same outward things can seem profound and beautiful to one person at one time, yet at another they can appear ridiculous or boring. Ultimately the thing that really matters in church, encountering God, is something which only comes from God. The Spirit is not a caged bird, she comes and goes at will, all we can do is open to her.

People may come to church if they enjoy it and for that it is worth all those late nights and careful thought to make services engaging. But it is only the deep joy encountering God which will really draw people from the heart to seek him. People may love church services, they may hate them, they may be bored by them, but ultimately they will keep coming because the heart that seeks God will seek everywhere and anywhere.



As a background there was the rickyard with its new yellow stacks and, over all, the mellow sunshine of late summer.

#### GOD IN THE SCIENCES


#### Parable: The Strength of a Seed

At this time of year, we enjoy the fruits of our gardens, fields and hedgerows: vegetables ripen, crops are harvested, and berries begin to show bright among the leaves. Much of this growth started with a few seeds in spring: the miracle of life coming from small dead-looking things. There is a league table of long-lived seeds. The winners so far are from the narrow-leafed campion, buried by squirrels in the Siberian permafrost over 30,000 years ago. When those seeds finally germinated, they became healthy plants that flowered and produced seeds of their own.

The Bible contains many links between seeds and spiritual growth, and the parable of the sower is the most famous (in Matthew 13). A person may hear or experience something of God which has the potential to germinate into a life of following Him, resulting in the fruit of others coming to know God too. But things can happen that snatch that seed away, killing it before it has finished germinating, or choking its growth.

What about the knowledge of God that gets trampled, churned too deep in the mire of life to receive the warmth and light it needs to develop into faith? Buried seeds don't always die, but they can lie dormant, remaining alive but inactive until the earth is turned over. The possibility of that moment of connecting with something divine, scrap of knowledge, or snatch of conversation resulting in a changed life may seem infinitesimally small, but it's not zero. The seed may be incredibly tough, just waiting for a chance to grow.

The Gospel narrative plays on the fact that it took a long time for the disciples to understand the full implications of Jesus' teaching: a germination process that took many of them three or more years. They could have been discouraged, but Jesus was not. I don't think it's too much of stretch to draw out of the parable of the sower to include the observation that it can take a long time, sometimes decades, for people to work their way through the various barriers, sticking points, and phases of forgetfulness that may keep them from following through on their spiritual experience. When we finally receive – or are open to – the encouragement, challenge, or experience that helps our faith in Christ grow, we can experience the rich fruit of a transformed life.

#### SHELSWELL POETRY APPRECIATION GROUP

At our July meeting we looked at various aspects of freedom found in poems. We began the session with *In the Same Boat by H.Crawford.* Written in the early years of the 20th century, it is a (seemingly light-hearted but in fact bitter and resentful) protest by a poet bemoaning the fact that women were not allowed to vote, just like prisoners, lunatics and babies. This was followed by the poem *The Tolpuddle Martyrs,* written by one of their number, George Loveless whilst he was in the courtroom awaiting judgement.

The Flower of Liberty by Oliver Wendell Holmes is a joyful celebration of the freeing of slaves in America during the Civil War. We actually sang the Union song *The Battle Cry of Freedom by George F. Root,* lifting the roof with the chorus, and then looked at the copycat version sung by troops of the Confederacy. *The Ragged Old Flag by Johnny Cash* examines southern pride and details all the wars soldiers from the southern states have fought in.

*Land of Hope and Glory by A C Benson* was set to music by Elgar and is an iconic anthem, as is **Rule**, **Britannia**, written for inclusion in the masque *Alfred by James Thompson* and set to music by Thomas Arne.

*Sagittarius,* (the nom de plume of a writer for the Spectator), wrote a sharply witty description of the Labour Party in 1945 then 1947, making fun of the public's fear of red revolution and how it was calmed by the respectability and good breeding of the Labour Cabinet. It is an extract from the longer work *Lest Cowards Flinch.* In his poem *England Autumn 1938, ASJ Tessimond* balances what he sees as the glories and grave faults of a country which had not fallen under the control of repressive ideologies such as Communism and Fascism.

*The Retreat from Dunkirk by B G Bonallack* gives a matter-of-fact account of that episode in the Second World War which is moving when we remember that the men on the beaches were escaping back to a free country in order to fight another day. In *Armistice Day 1918* Robert Graves caustically compares the jingoistic joy and licentious behaviour of a civilian crowd with the sacrifice made by the dead soldiers who fought for their freedom. *Partition Day 1947 by W H Auden* sums up the debacle caused by India gaining its freedom from the British Empire so precipitately and without due care and attention from its former rulers. The South African anthem *Nkosi Sikelele Afrika* has verses in four different languages – Xhosa, Sesutu, Afrikaans and English – and is used to wonderful effect, set to music, in the film *Cry Freedom.* 

Three poems about personal and artistic freedom, and its costs, are *Freedom is a Lonely Word by Sun Wenbo ; Me and Bobby McGhee by Kris Kristofferson and Janis Joplin*; and *Caged Bird by Maya Angelou.* 

The loss of freedom suffered by zoo animals is addressed by two poets. The Jaguar and Lioness Asleep are by Ted Hughes and Babette Deutsch respectively.

Our next meeting will be on Tuesday August 8<sup>th</sup> and the theme is Desert Island Poems. Each member will bring three much-loved poems to read and discuss.


Everything is now growing in earnest (unfortunately, including the weeds).

#### Interesting facts...Woad

A tithe record dated 1610, shows that woad was grown in Cottisford and Hethe. A Master Edward Ewere and Sir William Cope "both had wode growing in Hethe which amounted to more than all the wode grown in Cottisford". The Cope family owned Hanwell Castle (near Banbury) and first acquired the Shelswell Estate in 1595 selling it in the 1680s. The Shelswell Estate at that time included Hospital Farm which was originally owned in the 12<sup>th</sup> Century by St Bartholomew's Hospital (London) and was amalgamated into Montague Farm in the 20<sup>th</sup> Century. This was the probable location for the growing of woad.



Woad is a native of the Mediterranean and belongs to the family Cruciferae (the brassicas), as do broccoli, cabbage and rape seed. The neon yellow flowers, which appear in May, have a wonderful fragrance and attract plenty of bees. Grown in Europe since the Stone Age it has a long association with East Anglia, notably with Boudicca and the Iceni tribe who it is said used woad to colour their faces before going into battle. Woad is also believed to be antiseptic, and it may have been used to help heal battle wounds. # A look at the other Holt Memorials in the Church (a follow up to last month's piece on William Holt's memorial)

Ralph Holt's memorial can be found on the wall above the organ. It is very difficult to get an unobstructed view of it without taking your chances on the steps up to the tower.

According to the Holt family tree in J. C. Blomfield 's section on Stoke Lyne in the "History of the Present Deanery of Bicester," series, published in 1894, Ralph was the son of Thomas Holt and Susan Petty. He was the great x 2 grandson of William Holt whose memorial is to the left of the altar which was discussed in the July issue of Shelswell News.

The 2017 edition of "The Buildings of England" describes it as: "Large tablet of grey marble, with Composite columns and swan-neck pediment". I had to google what was meant by these descriptive terms. A Composite column is "a Roman-designed column style that combines characteristics of the ancient Greek-era Ionic and the Corinthian columns. Composite columns have highly decorated capitals (tops)" while a swan-neck pediment is: a broken pediment, the outline of which consists of a pair of S-curves tangent to the cornice level at the ends of the pediment, rising to a pair of scrolls on either side of the centre, where a finial often rises between the scrolls.

The inscription on the tablet reads: To the Memory of Ralph Holt Esq Lord of this manor who died Aug y 22nd 1702 in ye 65th year of his age. By his first wife Susanna, daughter of John Risley Esq. He had one daughter Susanna. By his second wife Susanna daughter of Francis Dodsworth Esq he had 7 children. Charles (who erected this monument), Elizabeth, Mary, William, Susanna, Thomas & Frances.



Ralph married his first wife, **Susanna Risley**, on 26th September 1659 at Chetwode. Their marriage did not last long: she died on 19<sup>th</sup> March 1660, aged about 20, perhaps as a result of complications arising from giving birth to their child Susannah. Susanna (Senior) is commemorated in St Mary and St Nicholas Church in Chetwode – an image of the memorial tablet can be found on the FindaGrave website: <a href="https://www.findagrave.com/memorial/229747853/susan-holt">https://www.findagrave.com/memorial/229747853/susan-holt</a>.

The inscription reads: "Here lyeth expecting a joyful Resurrection, the body of Susan, one of the daughters of Thomas Risley, of Chetwode, Esq., late the wife of Ralph Holt, of Stoke Lyne, in the County of Oxford, Esqr, who departed this mortal life the 19<sup>th</sup> of March, 1660, leaving behind her an only daughter."

His second wife **Susanna Dodsworth** is buried in the St Peter's church and commemorated on a stone slab behind the altar:

Blomfield points out that it has been "*removed from its original position*". He states that Ralph and Susanna married in Buckingham in 1664. From the Stoke Lyne burials register Susanna was buried on 16<sup>th</sup> January 1677. She would have been aged about 34 having been baptised in Whaddon on 26<sup>th</sup> August 1643.

According to the Victoria County History Ralph Holt became High Sheriff of Oxfordshire in 1678 (the appointment was listed in the London Gazette for November of that year), and held the manor until his death in 1702. He was succeeded by his son Charles, the last of the male line of the family, who probably held the manor until his death in 1731. Blomfield offers this account of Ralph: *'In the public strife of his early life he was a staunch Royalist. A story is current that* 



having done some good service to Charles II, the King offered to bestow upon him a baronetcy or knighthood, as a mark of royal favour. But he declined the proffered honour, only asking that he might be allowed to wear his coat of arms on a bird's breast". This was discussed in my article "Coles, Hawks and Stoke Lyne Manor House". which was published in the July 2021 issue of Shelswell News.



Ralph's sister **Susannah Holt** is also commemorated in the church on a slab in the floor of the chancel. She married the Rev. Edmund Major of Cowley. As the inscription says, she died on 14<sup>th</sup> July 1704.

You will see from the photographs that both Susanna Holt née Dodsworth and Susanna Major née Holt have the same set of symbols in the shields depicted on their memorial slabs but on opposite sides, namely three diagonal "fleurs-de-lis of the field" which can also be found in William Holt's "achievement" by the altar. These seem to date back to the Holts of Gristlehurst near Bury in Lancashire from whom Blomfield states that William's father Robert was descended. Wikipedia in an article entitled "Women in Heraldry" explains:

When married, a woman has the option of uniting her arms with those of her husband in what are called marital arms; their arms are impaled, meaning they are placed side by side in the same shield, with those of the man on the dexter (left, as seen from the front) and those of his wife on the sinister (right, as seen from the front).

If you click on the link provided above to look at the image of the memorial to Ralph's first wife in Chetwode church you will see that her arms, too, have the three diagonal "fleurs-de-lis" on the same side as those of his second wife's.


Susanna/Susannah seems to have been a popular female name of the time. The "Behind the Name" website gives this account of the name: "From "Sousanna", the Greek form of the Hebrew name "Shoshannah". This was derived from the Hebrew word "shoshan" meaning "lily" ... In the Old Testament Apocrypha this is the name of a woman falsely accused of adultery. The prophet Daniel clears her name by tricking her accusers, who end up being condemned themselves. It also occurs in the New Testament belonging to a woman who ministers to Jesus." It adds: "As an English name, it was occasionally used during the Middle Ages in honour of the Old Testament heroine. It did not become common until after the Protestant Reformation, at which time it was often spelled Susan."

While I was researching this article I discovered that the wall memorial to Ralph Holt (d. 1702) had been wrongly described as "Wall memorial to Susannah Holt d.1704" on the "National Heritage List for England" (NHLE) entry for St Peter's church which appears on the "Historic England" website. As this listing is often cited by other websites I decided to email them to point out the error, supplying photographic evidence to back up my claim, and was surprised how quickly they responded and corrected the entry - so if anyone spots anything amiss with any entry anywhere on the NHLE, it is not "set in stone" and can be amended.
